## **Examples of What Works**

We have two criteria for whether an initiative for the inner city or the truly disadvantaged works:

- Is the initiative successful based on scientific evaluation?
- Does the initiative function to reduce inequality? (See: How Do We Decide What Works and Doesn't?)

Based on these criteria, many of the initiatives that work fall under these headings: <u>preschool</u>; <u>public school reform</u>; <u>youth development</u>; <u>job training and alternatives to "work first;" community development corporations and banking</u>; and <u>problem-oriented community-based policing</u>. Taken together, these initiatives create a policy of <u>comprehensive interdependence</u>.

Our examples of what works are not exhaustive. Over time, we hope to build a much more complete directory. See other examples in **Publications**.
